

## Lost Burial Ground Project Additions & Updates April 2023

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<p>William Devilbiss (1790-1834) Harriett Devilbiss (1790-1841)</p>	<p>Ca. Co.</p>	<p>William Devilbiss (1790-1834) obtained the land in 1819 (Fr. Co. Deed JS 10-72 120.25 acres). William Devilbiss (1790-1834) died intestate with land sold by his wife Harriett Devilbiss in 1837 (Ca. Co. Deed WW 1-26 120.25 acres-<b>Except burying ground</b>). William Devilbiss (1790-1834) headstone is at the Uniontown Methodist Cemetery Uniontown MD. Unknown if it was moved there or was this the original location. Harriett Devilbiss (1790-1841) died New Bethel Indiana graveyard location unknown. The burying ground referred to in the deed is the same as Carroll Co. Cemetery Records Runnymede (aka Nusbaum) 2-18 on Baust Church Road Westminster MD.. <p>Abe Brighton (D.1847 age 60 years) African American</p>	<p>Fr. Co.</p>	<p>History of Western Maryland Vol. 1-J. Thomas Scharf shows Abe Brighton (D. 1847 age 60 years) servant of the Shriver family buried in the family graveyard of Judge Abraham Shriver. Remains of the Shriver Family moved to Frederick Mt. Olivet in 1904. In the 1845 will of Judge Abraham Shriver (Fr. Co. Will Vol 3-332) a servant Abraham is named. Abe Brighton does not show up on Find a Grave but his headstone is at Frederick Mt. Olivet (See link below). Abe Brighton is the oldest known African American buried in Frederick Mt. <p>John Chisholm (1735-1792) Margaret Chisholm (1740-1780)</p>	<p>Fr. Co.</p>	<p>John Chisholm (1735-1792) sold part of his large land holdings to John Compton in 1787 (Fr. Co. Deed WR 7-526 141 acres-<b>Except John Chisholm family burying ground 20' x 20'</b>) Park Mills Road Dickerson MD. <p>John Grossnickle (1717-1782) Susannah Grossnickle (D. 1803)</p>	<p>Fr. Co.</p>	<p>John Grossnickle (1717-1782) obtained in 1773 the patent Stoney Arabia (Fr. Co. #4551 502 acres). John Grossnickle (1717-1782) willed part of the land in 1782 (Fr. Co. Will GM 1-261) to his nephew Peter Grossnickle (1750-1822). In 1805 Peter Grossnickle (1750-1822) obtained a patent for the land he inherited named Two Brothers (Fr. Co. #4911 294 acres). Peter Grossnickle (1750-1822) married Christina Studenbaker (1754-1836). Find a Grave shows a photo of two gravestones one of which appears to be Christina Grossnickle (1754-1836). <p>Nathan T. Hammond</p>	<p>Fr. Co.</p>	<p>History of Western Maryland Vol. 1-J. Thomas Scharf shows Nathan T. Hammond buried in 1754 on the farm of Mr. Quynn. D.J. Lake Atlas New Market District 9 shows a John T. Quynn on Boyers Mill Road about ½ miles above Route 144. This is near the land holdings of Nathan Hammond starting in 1753. Unable to locate any estate records for a Nathan T. Hammond in 1754. Boyers Mill Road New Market MD. Area of 39.390773° -77.288622°</p>

<p>Ludwig Harbaugh (1728-1809) Wife-Christina Weller (1728-1797)</p>	<p>Fr. Co.</p>	<p>History of Western Maryland Vol. 1-J. Thomas Scharf shows Ludwig Harbaugh (D. 1809) buried in the graveyard on his own farm along with his wife Christina Harbaugh (D. 1797). Moved to St. Johns Reformed Cemetery 16923 Sabillasville Road. <p>Peter Hoffman Sr. (1705-1748) Wife-Maria Apollonia Traut (1709-1757)</p>	<p>Fr. Co.</p>	<p>Peter Hoffman from Daniel Dulany in 1746 (PG. Co. Deed EE-73 225 acres). Peter Hoffman Jr. sold the land to Governor Thomas Johnson in 1778 (Fr. Co. Deed WR 1-2 225 acres). Tract Rose Garden part of Taskers Chance (<b>Except graveyard for the dead of Peter Hoffman</b>). Maria Apollonia Hoffman married 2<sup>nd</sup> Frederick Unseld. Land became Rose Hill Manor. 1611 North Market St. Frederick MD. Area of 39.436345° -77.405635°</p>
<p>John Rine (1786-1849) Mary Rine (1786-1858)</p>	<p>Fr. Co</p>	<p>John Rine (1786-1849) obtained the deed to the property in 1824 from William Hibbus (Fr. Co. Deed JS 21-426). Land was willed in 1849 (Fr. Co. Will TS 1-42) to his daughter Lucy Ann Dixon (Wife of Thomas Dixon). Graveyard mentioned in 1926 (Fr. Co. Deed 372-263) as being located in the center of the garden. According to Find A Grave the headstones disappeared around 2008. The Maryland Historical Trust file below has a 1970's photo of the graveyard. Land became The Cracked Claw formerly known as the Peter Pan Inn. All the old structures are now gone and replaced by commercial establishments. Route 80 &amp; Route 355 Urbana MD. <p>John Smith (1721-1802)</p>	<p>Fr. Co.</p>	<p>John Smith (1721-1802) first obtained land by patent which includes the graveyard starting in 1744 (New Germany (PG. Co. # 1550 50 acres). Additional land was obtained which was resurveyed by John Smith into the tract Nothing Lost (Fr. Co. # 2821-85 207 acres). John Smith (1721-1802) willed the land in 1802 to his son George Smith (1776-1832) (Fr. Co. Will 3-530). Land was willed by George Smith (1776-1832) to his son Christian Smith in 1832 (Fr. Co. Will 1-400). Land was sold by Christian Smith in 1851 (Fr. Co. Deed WBT 14-180-<b>Except graveyard</b>).</p>

		<p>Smith Family Cemetery was located southwest of the intersection of Mt Philip Road and Ed Crone Road. One local said he remembers 15-20 stones from the mid-1960s. The stones were said to have been moved and used as paving stones for a house. Only three stones with carvings were found and moved nearby. Two broken stones-Henry Smith (1802-1821) &amp; Mary F. Smith (D. 18?? Age 67? Years. (Source: Brian Main)</p> <p>In the link to the Smith Family-Henry Smith is the son of Jacob &amp; Mary Ann Fout Smith (1774-1840). The Mary Smith stone date match Mary Smith wife of Jacob Smith and places her as mother of Henry Smith (1802-1821). Jacob Smith is the brother of George Smith. Frederick Mt. Olivet records show George Smith (1776-1832) &amp; family moved to Frederick Mt. Thomas Scharf shows Martha Snowden (D. 1855 age 28) faithful colored nurse of Edward and Elizabeth Shriver and was buried in the family graveyard of Judge Abraham Shriver. Remains of the Shriver Family moved to Frederick Mt. Olivet in 1904. <p>Nicholas Boswell (1781-1851)</p>	<p>Mo. Co.</p>	<p>Nicholas Boswell (1781-1851) obtained the land in 1831 (Mo. Co. Deed BS 4-411). Edward Boswell shows in the same location in the 1878 G.M. Hopkins Atlas (District 8 Mechanicsville) for Montgomery Co. MD. Catherine Miller (Heirs) (Mo. Co. Deed 1157-579 1948) sells 5 parcels involving the land where the graveyard is located. <b>Deed states reserve right to access the family burial ground.</b> Obituary for Susan Boswell (D. 1916 age 89) states buried in the family burial ground on the Boswell farm. Edward Boswell husband of Susan Boswell (D. 1916 age 89) died in 1905 at age 81 with no burial location listed. Catherine Miller (1857-1932) whose heirs sold the land in 1948 is the daughter of Edward &amp; Susan Boswell. 1860 &amp; 1870 Montgomery Co. MD Census show a daughter Catherine born in 1858. Catherine Boswell Miller was married to James N. Miller</p> <p>This is the same location as the Ligon Lane Cemetery and possible connection to the Boswell Family Cemetery listed in the Montgomery Co. <p>Benjamin Gaither (1763-1838) Margaret Gaither (1764-1830)</p>	<p>Mo. Co.</p>	<p>Henry Brookes (1728-1807) father of Margaret Gaither (1764-1830) obtained the land in 1799 (Mo. Co. Deed H-663 229 acres). Henry Brookes (1728-1807) willed the land to his daughter Margaret Gaither (1764-1830). Montgomery County Cemetery Inventory File 45 shows where the cemetery was located was sold to the Gloyds. Samuel Gloyd obtained the land in 1844 from Martha Gaither &amp; Eveline Hughes daughters of Benjamin &amp; Margaret Gaither (Mo. Co. Deed BS 12-396). <b>Eveline Hughes (1804-1887) in 1882 obtained the burial ground from Rebecca Gloyd (Mo. Co. Deed EBP 26-292 68 square perches).</b> Montgomery County Cemetery File 45 states cemetery is gone with 4 stones remembered by early 20<sup>th</sup> century residents. 20 Brookes Avenue Gaithersburg MD.</p> <p>39.144165° -77.198145°</p>

Co. Deed EBP 2-563) <b>Exclusive ¼ acre for family graveyard of John Heeter (Deceased)</b> . Frances Heeter Garrett (1818-1903) married William Garrett (1800-1864). James Magruder Sr. (1768-1823) Elizabeth Magruder (1775-1806)	Mo. Co.	James Magruder Family Cemetery ID 272. James Magruder Sr. (1768-1823) obtained the land in 1791 (Mo. Co. Deed D-670 152 acres). James Magruder Jr. willed the land to his wife Elizabeth A.T. Magruder (1808-1880>) in 1874 (Mo. Co. Will 6-84). Deed search made from (Mo. Deed 65411-40 2022) back to when James Magruder Sr. (1768-1823) obtained the land. Magruder (Heirs) sold the land in 1892 (Mo. Co. Deed JA 33-110-116). <b>Montgomery County Inventory File 272 states cemetery is mentioned in the deeds but no mention of a graveyard was found.</b> Montgomery County Cemetery File 272 states the owners believe they were Magruder Family burials. <p>Mount Pleasant Colored Burial Ground</p>	<p>Mo. Co.</p>	<p>Adrian R. Wadsworth first shows up in the 1860 Montgomery County MD Census and obtained a deed to the land in 1867 (Mo. Co. Deed EBP 4-7 263 acres). On 18 April 1878 Adrian R. Wadsworth deeded ½ acre to Baker Sedgewick &amp; Joseph Adams (Trustees) (Mo. Co. Deed EBP 28-19). For the benefit of colored people to receive title to a burying ground next to the Mt. Pleasant Colored School. School house lot deeded to Adrian R. Wadsworth, Richard Sedgewick, Wilson Powell, Thomas Adams, and John W. Johnson (Trustees) in 1868 for ½ acre to erect a colored school house (Mo. Co. States burial location in Hayes Family Burying Ground. <b>Burial location missing from Find a Grave.</b></p> <p>Note: Find A Grave shows her as the daughter of Samuel S. <p>Alpha Watkins (1803-1880) Harriett A. Watkins (1805-1882)</p>	<p>Mo. Co.</p>	<p>Unknown when Alpha Watkins (1803-1880) obtained the land. James W. Watkins (1848-1928) obtained the land in 1884 Equity Case (Mo. Co. Deed EBP 30-462-1/8 acre for graveyard). Maynard D. Watkins (1891-1981) son of James W. Watkins (1848-1928) obtained the land his father owned in 1929 (Mo. Co. Deed 492-23-1/8 acre for graveyard). Montgomery County Cemetery Inventory File 316 states Alpha Watkins (1803-1880) &amp; Harriett A. Watkins (1805-1882) were buried on their farm. Maynard D. Watkins Jr. had the graves moved around 1990 to Upper Seneca Baptist Church Cemetery Germantown MD. Davis Mill Road Germantown MD. Area of 39.230800° -77.218753°</p>

Thomas Windsor (1750-1810) Catherine Windsor (D. 1810>)	Mo. Co.	Thomas Windsor (1750-1810) obtained the land in 1793 from Henry Griffith (Mo. Co. Deed E-248 150 acres). Land was still in the family until the 1930's with the death of Randolph H. Windsor. The Windsor Record as recorded by Maria Elizabeth Waters Fardow great granddaughter of Thomas Windsor, January 1958, now in the Montgomery County Historical Society. States she remembers as young girl walking thru the back of the orchard reading the white marble tombstones. Maugansville takes its name from Abraham & Jonathan Maugan. Some of their children are buried in Broadfording Cemetery Hagerstown MD. Rohrer Family Graveyard?	Wa. Co.	History of Western Maryland Vol. 12-J. Thomas Scharf " Rohrer's Addition to Hagerstown, of which the new academy is now the most conspicuous object, was made by a collateral branch of this family, which is still perpetuated in some of the Western States. <b>The old family graveyard</b> , at the roots of the familiar old walnut tree near the Potomac Extension of the Franklin Railroad, is all that remains of that family, and soon that solitary souvenir will be obliterated by the plow." States Mrs. Medora Easterday Hemp in a 1917 letter stated the graveyard once contained many bodies. Headstone for Rachel Easterday Died 1830 age 68 (Wife of Jacob Easterday) was the only one found on a visit to the graveyard. Book states other graves moved to different area graveyards.
