Locating Slave & Free Black Graveyards

While searching for lost burial grounds one item was clear. Where are slaves and free blacks buried that died in 18th & 19th century Maryland?

Church graveyards for African Americans first appear in the 1850's with some slaves or free blacks buried next to their owners burial ground. With the number of people involved provisions had to be made for the dead due to sickness, disease, injury and old age. The responsibility would fall to the slave owner to provide a burial location. For example according to the 1850 Frederick County Maryland. Slave Owner Census 486 slaves show in Petersville District and 374 slaves in Liberty District. Then add to the list free blacks and the numbers rise quickly

How do you begin to locate a slave or free black burial ground? To date I have found only 3 references to early African American burial grounds in deeds and estate records. Late 1800 and early 1900 obituaries and death certificates have provided more information if they were buried in family graveyards.

The land of the slave owner for the time period will have to be mapped out. In addition the adjacent slave owner properties may also need to be mapped out to get a full picture.

With the use of deeds for the time period you need to locate the slave owner deeds and obtain the tract names for the property. Tracts of land will need to be mapped out and then the property of the slave owner mapped out. Then trace the owners forward in time to when the 1977 property tax maps were made. With the tax maps and Google Earth you should be able to make a good placement of the slave owning properties if development hasn't altered the area.

Obvious place to check would be where slave owning properties come together. Also land owners may have had an agreement for a common location for slave burials. Using Google Earth or early aerial photos other likely locations to check would be in corners along creeks, swampy areas or other non-tillable ground

With information obtained by Brian Main in locating family burial grounds in Frederick County and from Carroll County Maryland Cemetery Records. I took a look at the location of 20 white family graveyards using Google Earth to see if a pattern developed. A vast majority of the white family graveyards are in sight of the farmhouse at random locations out in the fields

Slave & Free Black Graveyards

Listed below are 10 known African American burial locations that I mapped the surrounding land which are located in Carroll, Frederick and Montgomery County. A pattern emerged with the majority of locations on the boundary lines of the tracts of land out of the way of farming. This in contrast to many white farm burial grounds that are out in the fields in the way of farming. Also included are Carroll & Montgomery County Almshouse graveyards which are located near the property line. Final two items are known large slave plantations in Frederick County.

In 1854 John Downey obtained the land (Downeys Lot Fr. Co. Patent# 1179 6 acres). He then sold lots starting in 1855 to free blacks in the area. In 1854 lots were sold to free blacks on the north side of John Downeys land by Henry Fetterling who bought the land of John Kitzmiller.

Could this be the location of an early slave burial ground?


Note: African American burial ground is located just up the road from Keys Chapel with the first dated burial in 1887. Burials still continue there today and its unknown if any earlier burials were made.





On the 1858 Bond Map the burial ground is located at the start of a forest with no occupants around it.


Land around burial ground remained in Brunner Family from 1809-1838 and beyond. The original 1753 property remained in John Brunner Family from 1753-1930's


Zachariah Waters Land




Henry Hilleary Land-Sprained Ankle 1790 Darnestown Road Germantown Maryland




Figure 4: 1908 Topographic map overlain with parcels purchased for the Poor Farm over the course of a century (color shaded areas) and the area where burials were found in 1987 (blue oval).




Figure 5: Proposed maximum limits of disturbance for expansion of I-270 (red outline) overlain on a 2019 aerial photograph with parcels purchased for the Poor Farm over the course of a century (color shaded areas) and the area where burials were found in 1987 (blue oval).

Victoria Vincendere Plantation (Frederick County (1795-1827)

Slave Burial Ground-Location Unknown

In the case of the Vincendere Plantation where would the probable location be? It is known where the slave quarters were located. In reading about slave burials the owners had security issues they had to deal with. The Vincendere Plantation shows 90 slaves in the 1810 census. Were all of the adult slaves allowed to attend a burial? Did the slave owner have the manpower to control the number of slaves attending? Emotions would be running high at this time as well as thoughts of escape. What were the avenues of escape?

Along the Monocacy River looks to be the probable location. Graveyard would be out of the way of cultivation and avenues of escape would be lowered. The burial would be close to the slave quarters which would get the slaves quickly back to a central location. Monocacy River would hinder or block escape to the south and east. At this time the Middle Ford Ferry was the main crossing in the area. The railroad didn't come along until well after Vincendere had sold the land.

Merry Land Tract was made up of many slave plantations from the mid 1700's up until Emancipation. Along the property lines or in any location were cultivation wasn't possible would be probable graveyard locations.
